





COUNTY COUNCIL says if your name's not on the list, you can't get in......to vote. With important Buckinghamshire **County Council elections taking place on May 2,** local people are being urged to check they are properly registered to vote and have their say.

County Council elections take place every four years, the last taking place in 2009. Local people right across Buckinghamshire will have the opportunity to vote for the County Councillor they wish to represent their local area. Elected councillors are responsible for spending over £325 million annually on major public services including education, social services, roads and environmental services.

Residents have until April 17 to be included on the official Register of Electors otherwise they will miss the chance to vote. Whilst most will already be registered, there may be people who have just moved house, or who have just turned 18 for example who may not be registered.

County Returning Officer Gill Hibberd said registering is simple and easy. "Voting whether at local, national or European levels is a fundamental part of our democracy. It gives local people an important say in how their areas are run and governed and I would urge everyone to check they are registered.

"County Council elections are administered on our behalf by the four District Councils within Buckinghamshire. All local people need to do to register to vote is to contact their relevant local district council by phone, e-mail or through their website." Applications for a new postal vote or to make changes to an existing postal vote have to be **submitted by 5pm on April 17**. **Applications for a proxy vote can be made up until 5pm on April 24**.

There are many people with dementia in Bucks who are living alone and feeling isolated. Some of them are housebound and spend most of the week not seeing anyone. Reliable, caring



Exploring Britain's Lost Railways A talk by Paul Atterbury

During the 1960s and early 1970s Britain was devastated by railway closures and many parts of the country were left without any kind of railway service. The timetables of the 1950s and early 1960s are therefore filled with journeys which are now either impracticable or impossible, and the landscape of Britain is scattered with the remains of abandoned railway infrastructure.

In his talk, Paul explores the whole world of railways, their history and their cultural and social impact, to discover what has been lost along with the closed lines and stations. It is a talk about history, memory and nostalgia for a railway network, and a way of life that today is very different.

ROAD treatment work under Transport for Buckinghamshire's (TfB) county-wide We're Working On It programme for 2012/13 is almost complete.

Just a handful of roads are outstanding, and these will be completed this month ahead of a new road treatment programme for 2013/14, which starts in late April.

When complete, the 2012/13 programme, which started last April, will have treated 178 roads across Buckinghamshire - the equivalent of: ?the weight of 5,825 elephants or 285 blue whales. ?the length of road from Aylesbury to Central London twice - with some miles left over. ?the area of 90 football pitches.??

The investment in the county's roads of £25 million, announced at the February county council meeting, will pay for the road treatment programme over the next two years, ensuring the improvement of Buckinghamshire's roads maintain a high priority. This is in addition to the £30 million spent on the We're Working On It programme since 2011. Peter Hardy, Buckinghamshire County Council Cabinet Member for Planning and Transportation, said: "I am delighted by the news that once again we are recognising one of Buckinghamshire residents' top priorities continues to be the condition of the roads. We are listening to this and investing a further, very welcome, minimum investment of £25 million enabling us to continue with this successful programme of works."

The Member-led approach to deciding which roads will be treated will continue into 2013/14. Each local Member will be asked to nominate a further five roads in their division that they believe are most in need of repair.

This significant increase in spending on road repairs helps address a large backlog of repair work, but even this amount of investment does not enable every road in Buckinghamshire to be treated.

TfB's Capital Maintenance Team have been working with Members on their schemes for the forthcoming year's programme, and engineers have been busy over the winter months assessing each road individually to decide the best road treatment to be used.

The new programme, to be released in the spring, will be available on the TfB website, and include daily updates on any proposed changes or delays to works. Updates can be followed on Twitter @tfbalerts.

Celebrating Buckinghamshire's volunteers

Hundreds of volunteers who help keep the wheels of Buckinghamshire turning have been honoured for their contribution to the community by County Council Chairman Marion Clayton.

They were invited to an evening reception in the Judges' Lodgings at Aylesbury on Tuesday (March 12).

More than 800 volunteers help Buckinghamshire County Council deliver services, from Master Composters and Simply Walk leaders to school governors and education appeal panel members.

Marion Clayton said: 'We should take great pride in the huge number of public spirited people in our county. Service to the community is something Buckinghamshire people are very good at.

'I want to recognise and celebrate this major contribution to the life of our county. If it wasn't for the support of so many volunteers, some projects just wouldn't run.'

Charitable trust to be set up to manage County's outdoor education centres

A new charitable trust is set to be developed to run the County Council's two outdoor education centres, Green Park at Aston Clinton and Shortenills at Chalfont St Giles, in partnership with Marlow-based Longridge Activity Centre. The trust, to be known as the Adventure Learning Foundation, will be a registered charity and a company limited by guarantee. It will be run by a Board of Trustees, comprising representatives from the founding centres, the County Council and existing centre users, who will oversee the trust's activities. Both Green Park and Shortenills will be transferred to the trust on a 25 year lease.

The development of the Foundation will give the Council greater flexibility to develop its outdoor education provision and help to better co-ordinate all three centres' offering and widen the range of activities.

In addition, it will help to protect Green Park and Shortenills as valuable resources for the county and enhance them for future generations.

The Foundation will also help to provide a sound opportunity to raise funds from external outdoor education, activity and sport providers, ensuring the Foundation offers a quality service at a lower cost to the taxpayer.

Chris Munday, Service Director for Learning, Skills & Prevention, said: "In these challenging economic times we need to find new ways of maintaining our most valued services. By setting up a charitable trust like the Adventure Learning Foundation, we're enabling Green Park and Shortenills to benefit from the huge wealth of experience and excellent track record that Longridge Activity Centre bring with them.

"This collaboration will ensure that the educational experience for children and young people at our centres will be better than ever before, while at the same time saving money by running the centres more effectively."

Amanda Foister, Chief Executive Officer of Longridge said: "We are delighted to be a founding member of the Adventure Learning Foundation. As well as providing Longridge with cost-saving and operational benefits, the Foundation will give us the opportunity to work with the existing team to unlock all of Green Park's and Shortenills' potential."

Green Park and Shortenills hosts approximately 96,000 visitors a year. Green Park offers adventure learning and sports facilities as well as conferencing, set against a backdrop of 80 acres of beautiful woodland and parkland. Shortenills is an Eco Centre Green Flag accredited centre, offering valuable outdoor education in beautiful natural surroundings. The Foundation will be established by July 2013 and will be operational from October 2013.

Public Health responsibilities formally handed over to local government

This week saw the transfer of public health responsibilities from the NHS back to local government.

The transfer, which took place on April 1, is one of the outcomes from the Health and Social Care Act 2012. With many of the issues that affect public health already dealt with by local councils, the transfer should improve the health and wellbeing of local residents.

Buckinghamshire County Council Chief Executive Chris Williams said:

'In many ways public health is "coming home". The origins of public health lie in establishing clean water, clean air, proper sewage systems, roads and housing.

Many of the determinants that affect public health are the responsibility of local government and, therefore, it makes sense that we take on the health and wellbeing duties too.'

Jane O'Grady, Buckinghamshire's Director of Public Health, said the move of public health responsibilities to the County Council offered excellent opportunities to improve the health and wellbeing of residents.

Jane said studies had shown that health care accounts for about 25% of people's health. The major influences on health were the circumstances and environments into which people are born, grow, live and work.

'This transfer of responsibility has huge potential in terms of the services already commissioned and provided by the county council, and the influence of the council on shaping the kind of communities we live in,' she said. 'We'll be able to draw on the community leadership role of Members and the strength and engagement of communities themselves, to improve their health.

'If we can make small changes in the way services are delivered, we could make a big difference to people's health.'
