THE super new A30 bus which comes through Chalfont St Peter every half hour has proved valuable to those who want a reliable bus service to Chesham, Amersham, Uxbridge, Gerrards Cross, Chalfont St Giles and Heathrow. If you are a senior citizen and have a bus pass, you can reach all these places FREE and not pay out for petrol or add to the carbon footprint. It also means that you can relax and rely on the return journey. The new timetables are now available and there should be some in the Community Centre, as well as the Library, or of course from bus stations. If you haven't tried the A30, it's worth giving it a trial run.

THE County's Household Waste Recycling Centres are open from 8am to 5pm from Sunday 25th October. Our local site is London Road East, Amersham HP7 9DT. All sites are open seven days a week, except for 25 December, 26 December and 1st January.

BEWARE of a company called SAS Fire and Security which is cold-calling residents and offering to install 'free' security systems with a 'small' ongoing monitoring and maintenance cost. The company is also saying that the security systems are being offered in conjunction with Chiltern District Council's wintertime burglary events that are currently being run at local train stations and town centres. IT'S already one of the safest places to live in Britain -and crime prevention agencies in Buckinghamshire are working hard to keep it that way.

Buckinghamshire's Community Safety partnership will be running various activities and events across the county during 'Not In My Neighbourhood Week' (NIMNW) during 2 - 6th November 2009. The week will demonstrate how agencies including the Council and the Police work and how residents can play their part. NIMNW is about residents joining forces with local agencies to say no to local crime, robbery and burglary, anti-social behaviour, alcohol and drug misuse. Work in Buckinghamshire will involve targeting residents' specific concerns about the area in which they live, stepping up environmental awareness, and raising awareness of trading standards rules.

Over £18,000 was taken towards the Poppy Appeal 2008-9 by collectors in our catchment area last autumn. However, on the 17th of July, the National total was in excess of £30 million, towards which Bucks contributed £533,136.

POLICE are warning people to be on the alert when withdrawing cash from ATM machines. There have been several incidents recently in Beaconsfield, Chesham and Amersham.

In Beaconsfield on Tuesday evening suspects had attached a mobile phone in a blue box directly above the keypad, and a false grey card slot had been placed over the genuine card slot. At least one member of the public had attempted to withdraw money and had lost their card to the device.

This sort of skimming device is often referred to as a Lebanese loop. The perpetrators will target ATM's that are not covered by CCTV, generally those outside the banks or in other public places. They are usually set up when the banks are closed to avoid detection and prevent customers alerting the bank immediately.

By this method they obtain both the card and the PIN number, allowing them to withdraw the maximum amount of cash the bank will allow in seconds. They will make as many withdrawals as they can until the card is stopped. Offenders will move around an area, targeting banks on consecutive days in neighbouring towns, so people across the whole of Bucks and Berks need to be aware.

Do be vigilant when using any ATM. If anything looks unusual, or parts do not seem to be properly attached, do NOT use the machine. If the bank is closed, move away from the area and phone the police immediately dialling 999, as this is a crime in progress. Often the offenders will be hanging around in the vicinity and a quick response from police can result in significant arrests.

DO NOT TRY TO REMOVE THE DEVICE or approach anyone acting suspiciously around an ATM. The devices are very valuable to the scammers and they have previously used violence to retain them. The police are also keen to preserve any forensic evidence that may lead us to a suspect

National survey shows Buckinghamshire residents enjoy a high quality of life

The vast majority of Buckinghamshire residents think their county is a good place to live, a major Government survey has revealed.

Eighty-six per cent of respondents to the nationwide Place Survey reported themselves satisfied with their local area – a jump of 7% since an equivalent study carried out two years ago.

Buckinghamshire residents' levels of satisfaction with where they live are way ahead of the national average, which stands at under 80%, as well as the rest of the south east region.

The county also scored highly for the well-being of residents and their perceived low levels of anti-social behaviour. A greater proportion of residents in Buckinghamshire assessed their health as good or very good than anywhere else in England, while fewer respondents cited drunk and rowdy behaviour as a problem here than any other part of the country.

The Place Survey also showed that Buckinghamshire residents are among the most generous with their time in England, with over 30% giving unpaid help at least once a month.

Buckinghamshire County Council leader David Shakespeare said: "These findings confirm what we already knew – that Buckinghamshire continues to be an extremely attractive place to live, work and raise a family.

"However, we are far from complacent. We remain determined to work with our partners across the county to build and maintain strong, health and safe communities.

"We know there is much more to be done, and together with our district council colleagues in Aylesbury Vale, Chiltern, South Bucks and Wycombe we are striving to improve services and offer our residents value for money."

Among the areas the survey highlighted for improvement in Buckinghamshire included the need for improvements to roads and pavements in the county.

To address this, Buckinghamshire County Council invested an additional £3.25million into highway maintenance in 2008/09 and £4million for 2009/10. This year's commitment brings the total budget for routine maintenance and repair to £7.1million. The work is targeted at those areas identified as being a priority and ranges from sign cleaning through to patching work.

All councils in the country were surveyed as part of the study and data was collected in late 2008 with responses drawn from across all four districts in Buckinghamshire.
