
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<u>Chalfont St Peter to Celebrate Queen's Diamond</u>

TO mark Queen Elizabeth II's Diamond Jubilee Chalfont



Residents of Chalfont St Peter will be able to join in the celebrations for Her Majesty the Queen's Diamond Jubilee by attending the lighting of a beacon on Gold Hill Common on Monday 4 June. Timed to take place at 10.15 pm it will be part of a nationwide lighting of over 2012 beacons culminating with The Queen lighting the National Beacon at 10.30pm. Everyone is welcome to watch the spectacular blaze.

It is planned that the beacon will also be lit on future festivals and celebrations including the annual Feast of St Peter which this year takes place on 30 June.

Parish Council Chairman John Hatton said "The council wanted to do something special and permanent in Chalfont St. Peter for the Diamond Jubilee and we felt a Beacon could be used for other purposes such as Feast Day or special events. The Beacon cost the village nothing due to the fact that we applied for a grant. Beautifully made from iron and oak it looks fantastic and will be pretty spectacular when lit. I hope that everyone can come and see it on the 4th of June when we will be lighting it as part of a national chain of beacons across the UK. Please bring the family!" EXCITING opportunity to be involved in new police accountability arrangements

Two community-minded individuals are being sought to join the Thames Valley Police and Crime Panel, a new body that will examine policing plans in Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Oxfordshire.

The Thames Valley Police and Crime Panel is being established to monitor and scrutinise the work of the Police and Crime Commissioner, who will be elected for the first time by the public in November to oversee, on behalf of residents, the work of Thames Valley Police. The Panel will be made up of one councillor from each of the 18 local authorities in the Thames Valley, as well as the two independent co-optees.

Recruitment has just started for these two co-optee positions and the Panel is keen to encourage applications from anyone who feels they could take on this exciting and important role. The role of the co-optees is to act as an independent voice on the Panel and selection will be based on the knowledge, skills and expertise the individuals can bring. The co-optees could have a professional background in an area such as community safety, criminal justice or victim support. Alternatively, a strong track record of relevant voluntary work would be just as valuable. Applications are being particularly encouraged from under-represented groups.

Anyone interested in applying for one of the independent co-optee roles must be able to dedicate around one day per month and attend a minimum of six meetings each year at varying locations in the Thames Valley. Co-optees would serve a four year term. No allowance is paid for the roles, but travel expenses will be paid and all relevant training will be provided. The closing date for applications is 13 July.

BUCKINGHAMSHIRE will be bursting with bunting - all 84 miles of it - to celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee weekend in June. And with only a week to go, 75 communities have now registered to light celebration beacons on Monday June 4.It will be a big weekend for celebration that will include 62 community events across the county - tea parties, picnics, Big Lunches and dances - while street parties in 135 closed roads have been planned. Enough flags and bunting to stretch from one end of Buckinghamshire to the other have been ordered by 128 parishes throughout the county. 'Buckinghamshire will be celebrating in right royal style,' said the new County Council Chairman, Marion Clayton. 'We may be going through some gloomy economic times but it's great news that so many communities are looking on the bright side. They've pulled out all the stops to make this a weekend to remember.'

Marion will be hosting a gathering at Ellesborough before Lord Lieutenant Sir Henry Aubrey-Fletcher lights the county council's official beacon on Coombe Hill. Cadets from the three forces built the beacon, which will blaze after a 21-gun salute by the Royal Artillery at 10pm, and to the accompaniment of music from the band, Whirlwind, which starts at 8.45pm.

Simultaneously, other parishes will celebrate in style. At Mursley, a fire eater will light the village beacon and one of the guests of honour will be Joey the horse, star of Steven Spielberg's film War Horse.

Among other jubilee celebrations, St Mary's Church, Aylesbury, is planning a church-top lazer light show, and Halton's RAF Hot Air Balloon Club will light a beacon which will be heading to London in a balloon.

The County Museum, in Church Street, Aylesbury, is hosting a week of Jubilee events. The museum and Roald Dahl Children's Gallery will open every day from June 2 to 9, including Sunday June 3, from 10am to 5pm. The exhibition celebrates the visits of two Jubilee Queens - Victoria and Elizabeth II - to Bucks.

During the half term week children will be able to create their own Jubilee mementos at the museum: souvenir plate design on Tuesday June 5, celebration hankies on Wednesday June 6, and Jubilee memory boxes on Thursday June 7. Sessions, between 10am and noon, and 1pm and 3pm, cost £2.50 per child. Under 12s must be accompanied by an adult.

STATE of the County debate a first for Bucks. The big issues and challenges facing the Council in the coming five years were top of the agenda in the first ever State of the County debate at Buckinghamshire County Council's annual general meeting at the end of May. The curtain-raising debate, a new addition to the AGM, will help set the direction and shape the future for the county council. Keynote speaker Professor Tony Travers, from the London School of Economics, outlined issues affecting national and local government looking into the future. He said that with the radical change in the direction of public spending, local government would continue to face deep spending reductions in the coming years.

Members were also given briefings from five 'expert witnesses' on transport and planning, economic development, children and education, health and wellbeing, and crime and community safety. County Council Leader Martin Tett said the State of the County debate was an important innovation allowing Members to discuss the issues and challenges that would impact on the shape of services in the coming years.

Members had the opportunity to question speakers and debate the issues raised. The outcomes will provide a starting point for the development and planning of the Council's next four-year Corporate Plan covering 2013 to 2017. County Council Chairman Marion Clayton, who chaired the three-hour debate, said: 'We had excellent speakers who gave us much to think about and Members contributed thoroughly to the debate.'

Mr Tett said: 'The debate has really helped to focus on our priorities, the difficult choices and the tough, sometimes controversial decisions ahead of us. I'm sure members of this council are up for it and I look forward to working together as we go forward.' Earlier Mrs Clayton (Wendover) was invested as Chairman for 2012/13 by outgoing Chairman Mike Colston. Carl Etholen (Princes Risborough) is the new Vice Chairman.

THE Business Driver Assessment Scheme begins its 3rd year of operation in May 2012 having given further driver training to over 150 business drivers since its launch in 2010.

Nationally and in Buckinghamshire, business drivers account for a third of road collisions where someone is killed and seriously injured. The Business Driver Assessment Scheme, which helps motorists drive more safely for their companies, is promoted by Buckinghamshire County Council's Road Safety Team and makes places available to businesses across the county at the subsidised rate of £42 per two-hour session.

Each practical on-road assessment, with a qualified instructor, will look at driving risks and how best to tackle them, offering advanced driving techniques alongside fuel efficiency tips and advice on how to use in-car safety equipment correctly. A DVLA licence check is also included.

Peter Hardy, Buckinghamshire County Council Cabinet Member for Planning and Transport, said: "Companies have a duty of care for employees who drive for work, and the Business Driver Assessment Scheme provides training to help meet this need. Drivers who attend this course could go onto become safer drivers and may as a result save running costs for their company."

A driving for work education display stand will be at shopping centres throughout the month of May to promote the message of safer business driving.

According to the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents, advanced drivers who have the knowledge and skill to drive safely and effectively in all conditions are 25% less likely to be involved in a crash.

The Road Safety Team at Transport for Buckinghamshire also have free driving for work resources to help organisations manage safety issues their staff will encounter on the road. These are produced by RoSPA and include topics such as:

- safer speed policy
- mobile phones
- motorcycling
- o drink and drugs
- o own vehicle

Businesses can also request driving for work posters to display at their work place on notice boards for their employees to view.

Business Driver Assessments are subsidised by Transport for Buckinghamshire for Buckinghamshire residents. SMALL changes to the way we live with far-reaching results are being championed by Buckinghamshire County Council. They aim to save families money on household budgeting while helping to improve the community environment.

The council aims to recruit volunteer champions to encourage residents to:

- ** Reduce the amount of food thrown away.
- ** Cut energy costs and carbon emissions.
- ** Combat litter.

In the UK we throw away one third of the food we buy: we cook or prepare too much, we half-finish food, or we let it go off, says the Love Food Hate Waste campaign. Recruitment has just started for volunteer Community Food Champions to spread the 'love food hate waste' message around their communities, and to encourage residents to 'eat local' and 'grow your own'. It is a Buckinghamshire Waste Partnership initiative.

February marks the start of a recruitment drive by the county and district councils to build a corps of volunteer Community Energy Champions to help residents save money and improve the environment.

Their objective will be to encourage friends, family and neighbours to be more aware of how much energy they can save at home, resulting in lower fuel bills and cuts in CO2 emissions.

They'll be trained in simple measures people can take at home to save energy, like switching off equipment when not in use, choosing energy-efficient appliances, and getting homes insulated. It's all designed to help communities work towards national carbon reduction and renewable energy targets.

Martin Phillips, Cabinet Member for Community Engagement, said: 'These show we're very much on the ball when it comes to encouraging a Big Society culture among our communities. They're good initiatives, with good community benefits and I'm delighted we've been able to fund them.'

Also on the horizon is a Waste Partnership 'Love Where You Live' campaign to encourage pride in people's communities, with an emphasis on attitudes towards litter and action against litter.

Buckinghamshire councils spent £4 million collecting around 6,500 tonnes of litter in 2010/11, which cost the County Council another £500,000 in disposal and landfill tax.

Money for these projects has come from the county council's Big Society Fund.

TRANSPORT for Buckinghamshire (TfB) has organised two 'Be a Better Biker' training and assessment days during June and July. Each 'Be a Better Biker' assessment day allows bikers to be put to the test by highly trained assessors and shown how they can improve their skills to make biking even more enjoyable. Each one-day course costs £50 with TfB contributing the rest of the cost of the session.

The next courses are on Saturday June 16 at Great Holm fire station, Milton Keynes and Saturday July 7 at Marlow fire station.

Peter Hardy, Cabinet Member for Transportation said, "These assessment days are the ideal opportunity for bikers to have their skills analysed and be given pointers on how to improve. The overwhelming demand for places is testimony to the success of the campaign and will play a valuable part in reducing casualties on our roads. I would urge motorcyclists to get involved with this excellent scheme and to book early."

Previous attendees have said the courses are "excellent value for money" and "a scheme everyone should be made to take part in".

TfB's `Be a Better Biker` is now in its ninth year. Since the courses began in 2004 there has been a significant drop in biker crashes. As part of the assessment day, riders are taken out on the roads where motorcycle casualties have previously occurred. The 'Be a Better Biker' campaign, has promoted the benefits of post-test training, to ensure that a biker's riding capabilities best match those of their machine.
