IN SPITE of only having organised Saturday's Ant-HS2 Piano recital single-handedly in under three weeks, David Meacock is celebrating its success all round. David said afterwards that he sensed that people were really listening as you could have heard a pin drop in the silences, and there has only been positive feedback afterwards. The church looked pretty full, and while it would have been nice to have had even more there, the recital still raised just over £1,300 towards the costs of the Judicial Review, and there has already been interest in the idea of doing other similar fund-raising recitals further up the proposed route. In the meantime, Meacock is preparing for the A40 Choir *Passion Music* Concert, again in St. Mary's Amersham on 10 March.

Passion Music has been inspired by the emotions of the Easter story: the despair and sadness of Christ's crucifixion and the joy and hope of His resurrection.

The choir will be joined by professional soloists Celena Bridge, soprano, and Rupert Reid, bass (photos attached), Malcolm Hicks, who is often seen playing the organ at the *BBC Last Night of the Proms*, as well as David Meacock's wife Kate who will be singing in the choir.

A spokesman for the A40 Choir enthused: "The A40 Choir performed Liszt's nowadays rarely heard dramatic setting of Psalm 13 in the late 90's and we liked it so much then that we asked our conductor David Meacock to programme it again - this time with him singing the tenor solos himself and with the piano accompanied version, which works really well. It will be most interesting to hear Celena and Rupert singing a couple of Fauré's relatively not so well-known songs alongside two of his most popular pieces in the whole of the choral repertoire: his *Requiem* and *Cantique de Jean Racine*; both of which are frequently requested and broadcast on *Classic FM*."

RESIDENTS' USED COOKING OIL GETS TURNED INTO ELECTRICITY

Buckinghamshire residents have helped to recycle over 28,000 litres of used cooking oil since 2009 at the county's 10 household waste recycling centres, which when converted to electricity is enough to make nearly seven million cups of tea.

Buckinghamshire County Council teamed up with Living Fuels, a renewable energy producer, to install used cooking oil containers at the recycling centres. Living Fuels recycle the collected oil into bio-liquid, which is used to generate green electricity and heat for customers all around the UK.

Throwing used cooking oil down the sink can cause damage to drains and sewers and is a wasted resource. It can also be dangerous to wildlife if oil finds its way into lakes and ponds.

Steven Adams, Cabinet Member for Environment, said: "I would like to thank residents for making use of this service. They have made a very valuable contribution to saving precious resources from going to waste. The more we use these services, the more we can do to improve our environment for future generations."

Anyone interested in the history of Buckinghamshire can also order and pay on-line for copies of certificates, which date as far back to the year 1837.

TRADING Standards' scam emails warning - Incidents of scam emails being sent from hacked email accounts is on the rise, says Buckinghamshire's Trading Standards team, who are reminding members of the public to be aware.

The fake emails, which look like they have been sent from the genuine email address of a friend or a family member, are sent to all addresses in the address book of the hacked email account. The email will usually be titled "I need your help" or "I'm in trouble", and will ask the recipient to send a 'loan' in excess of £1,000. The cause of these types of emails is usually that the sender's email address has been hacked into by a cyber criminal.

Martin Phillips, Cabinet Member for Community Engagement, said: "If you receive an email of this nature, we advise you to try to establish if your friend or family member really is in need of help. If it's your email account that has been hacked into in this way, contact your email service provider who will be able to restore your email address for you."

All major web-based email service providers are aware of the problems with account hacking and now offer a system to quickly restore email addresses if they are hacked.

COUNCIL Tax in Chiltern frozen for the second year running

In 2012/13 the Chiltern District Council element of residents' total council tax bill will be £159.50 for an average Band D property – which is the equivalent of just 44 pence per day. This helps pay for a wide range of services including housing support, planning, refuse and recycling services and street cleaning.

Leader of Chiltern District Council, Nick Rose said: "Due to reduced government funding we have a reduction in revenue over the last two years of almost £1.2 million or 30% - a not insignificant figure for a small council to manage. Yet despite this we have been able to avoid cuts to frontline services by focussing on reducing back office costs and streamlining processes, coupled with prudent financial management."

In balancing it's a budget for the 2012/13 financial year, the council has had to offset reductions in income and increases in unavoidable costs plus save almost half a million from its £10.4 million net revenue budget. Over the next four years CDC will need to find in excess of £1 million savings, with over half of this needed in 2013/14.

To ensure we achieve these savings over the next three years the council will:

1. Continue to work with South Bucks District Council to find opportunities for savings by sharing services whilst at the same time protecting and improving service delivery. This will realise shared savings of over £500,000 per annum for the two councils once the new structure is in place in 2015.
2. Award the joint waste contract with Wycombe District Council which will result in estimated savings for Chiltern of £300,000 per year from 2013.
3. Launch its new website which will bring greater take up of services on line, reduce transaction costs and improve service delivery and accessibility for our customers and deliver £50,000 of savings over the next five years.
4. Continue to invest in energy savings measures that will reduce both costs and carbon emissions.

One of the ways in which the council can offset cuts is to increase its income, so some fees and charges for services will increase from 1 April. There will be modest increases in car parking charges in the off-street car parks across the district to help minimise the impact of reduced government funding on key services.

The budget setting process has been long and detailed and included an opportunity for residents to express their views. Although CDC collects the council tax, 90% is passed to Bucks County Council, the Fire and Police Authorities and parish and town councils.

TRANSPORT for Buckinghamshire (TfB) is planning to carry out highway maintenance repairs to the North Orbital Road (A412), Denham, as part of its 'We're Working on It' programme. The work is being done to improve the condition of the road and prolong its life.

Phase Two - is due to start on Thursday 19 April 2012 and should be completed by Saturday 21 April. This work will be carried out during the day between 9:30am to 3:30pm.

All access to properties and businesses will be maintained during the works and every effort will be made to carry out the works with the minimum disturbance. Attempts will also be made to keep noise levels on the site as low as reasonably possible at all times. However, due to the nature of these works, noisy activities may occur at times throughout the period.

TfB apologises for any inconvenience that may be caused. It also seeks your cooperation of road users during the course of the works. The work is highly weather dependent but it is necessary to maintain a safe condition for road users.

STREET Light Energy Saving Trial- Consultation on results from Buckinghamshire County Council's final nine streetlight energy-saving trial sites starts today (Monday, February 20).

A successful three-year street light energy-saving trial took place at 46 locations across Buckinghamshire and finished at the end of last year. The consultation on the proposals for the initial 37 sites came to end on December 11 and decisions are currently being finalised.

The data for the three-year period for the remaining sites is now being analysed and Transport for Buckinghamshire (TfB) is now seeking final comments on the recommendations for these sites. The trial runs until April 15.

The trial has been successful in saving energy, reducing CO2 emissions, saving money and reducing light pollution.

Peter Hardy, Cabinet Member for Transportation said: "The trial has been carefully monitored and TfB has considered the data collected and feedback received during the three year trial which has been presented to me. There will now be one final opportunity for the public and interested parties to view the summary information collated for each of these remaining sites prior to a decision being made."

At all trial sites a number of factors were considered when making the recommendations for the permanent solution including:

Collision history

Community safety issues

Accessibility issues

Feedback from the public and other parties during the trial.

Leader welcomes government's broadband support

Government funding of £1.96 million to support the development of superfast broadband in the county was welcomed today (Thursday February 16) by Buckinghamshire County Council Leader Martin Tett.

A joint bid for funding, led by Buckinghamshire Business First in strategic partnership with Hertfordshire County Council, was submitted last autumn to the government's Broadband Delivery UK initiative, which is investing £530m nationally.

Martin, announcing the successful bid at a meeting of the county council, said: 'This is fantastic news, and essential for making Buckinghamshire a place to start and grow a business in the 21st century. There's still work to do in getting match-funding, but I hope we'll soon be moving forward to invite bidders to supply what is undoubtedly critical business and social infrastructure for the decade ahead.

'Undoubtedly, this supports our commitment to make the county a great place to do be.

The government's aspiration is for at all parts of the country to have access to 2Mbs speeds and at least 90% of the country to have access to superfast broadband (24Mbs or above).

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protection of front line services, investment in roads and a council tax freeze were supported by Buckinghamshire County Councillors today (Thursday, February 25) when they approved a £327.7 million budget for 2012/13.

PRESENTING the budget to full council, Leader Martin Tett said it was set against a difficult global and national outlook, which meant tough times locally. The budget for the coming year anticipates savings of £21.7 million.

'The way we deliver services has been changing and must continue to change,' he said. 'There will be an increasing need for strong member leadership and clear priorities for the council as a whole.'

Outlining those priorities, Mr Tett said the county council would:

** Protect services to the most vulnerable

** Increase investment in roads

** Make significant capital investment in school buildings and property

** Maintain grant funding for the voluntary sector

** Give a strong focus to encouraging jobs, particularly for young people

'While we will continue to value excellent standards of service for our residents, we are increasingly moving away from direct service delivery ourselves to delivering with and through others,' he said.

The 2012/13 budget of £327.7m was prepared in the light of a 10.4% (£8 million) reduction in core Government funding and accounted for service pressures such as an ageing population, an increasing number of looked after children,

inflationary pressures and increasing landfill tax. It ensures the county council can meet financial challenges ahead, protect grants to the voluntary sector, and continue support for the most vulnerable.

Total Capital investment in 2012/13 will be £106m to spend in areas like improving schools, repairing buildings, and investing in new technology to bring down running costs.

The Capital programme also provides for an additional £5 million investment in road maintenance, the highest priority area identified by residents and businesses. The county's current £30m two-year road programme will be supported by £15m investment in the following two years.

In the coming three years revenue reductions of £42m must be found, on top of the expected £26m saved in 2011/12, said Mr Tett. Of these savings 85% will be service efficiencies rather than cuts, meaning a minimal impact on the level and quality of services provided to residents.

TRANSPORT for Buckinghamshire will be undertaking highway maintenance works to the carriageway of the A4 Bath Road between Lake End Road and Hitcham Road as part of the 'We're Working on It' programme. This work is being undertaken to improve the condition of the road in order to prolong its life.

The work will involve removing and replacing the existing surfacing to provide a sound surface. This work is expected to start on Wednesday 7th March 2012 and it is anticipated to take 8 weekday nights to complete, subject to disruption due to inclement weather. If the works are delayed, the advance notice signs at either end of the site will be updated to reflect any change in dates. The works are being undertaken overnight due to the volume of traffic using this road during the day.
