If you feel like an entertaining night out, see the classic comedy showing at Windsor. 'The Grass is Greener' was written in the England of the 50s by a couple who knew about crafting a plot and writing good dialogue because they were actors themselves.

It's light and amusing and set in a stately home and if there's a message, it is that wives do better staying with their husbands, no matter how fascinating they find an American oil millionaire who has fallen for them at first sight.

Christopher Cazenove plays the noble lord and landowner, Victor, in whose drawing room we find him totting up the day's takings from visitors. Liza Goddard is Hilary, his brisk wife, who makes a little money by growing mushrooms. Eric Carte is Sellars, the Butler, an ex-teacher, who has an amazing knack of being funny when speaking quite ordinary lines.

Into this happy household comes Charles, an American tourist, straying into the private drawing room. He finds Hilary alone and sets about wooing her, seriously. Her nervous and bewildered reactions to this situation and his persuasive technique are most convincingly done.

The scene that follows is between the butler and Victor. Hilary has gone off to London ostensibly to stay with her friend Hattie, (Sophie Ward). In a burst of emotion, Victor shows genuine upset at what he recognises could be the end of his marriage, even though he would forgive her for this fling.

Drama mounts when Hattie, a former girlfriend of Victor's, actually turns up at the house. Sophie Ward brings elegance and sophistication to this part, contrasting well with the nervy Hilary who can barely think straight, especially now that Victor has invited Charles for the weekend. More ingenious situations follow - some very funny, but it comes right in the end for Victor, Hilary and their butler who resume their quiet but pleasant lives
