EXPLORE the sights, sounds and smells of a traditional Harvest

On the weekend of 17th and 18th October, visitors to Chiltern Open Air Museum can join in a traditional harvest festival and find out about the customs and celebrations of the past. Visitors can learn about historic farming activities, enjoy traditional folk singing and take part in some harvest themed family crafts. Henton Mission Room, the Museum's beautiful rescued tin chapel, will be home to a festive display of harvest produce grown at the museum.

Visitor Experience Manager Siân Hammerton-Fraser said, "The Museum's mission is to preserve not just buildings but also traditional skills from the past, and as we have an historic working farm, harvest time is really important for us just as it was for our ancestors. Visitors can enjoy first-hand the sights, sounds and smells of traditional harvest activities including witnessing our restored 1947 Ransomes Simms & Jeffries threshing machine in action in the farmyard (as long as the rain holds off!). There's plenty to keep the whole family amused!"

Families can take a trip around the Museum's fields and woodland to discover the local wildlife and to meet the Museum's livestock including the new Museum goats, friendly horses, rare-breed Oxford Down sheep, silver Dorking chickens and - if you're lucky - the elusive farm cats.

Sometimes I wonder quite how many junk-mail boxes it falls into but, encouragingly, I often meet people who confess to reading it and even promise to join a work party one day! Everyone's support in whatever form, even if that is just spreading the word in the village, or a little litter picking while out and about, or a once in a blue (or orange??) moon appearance at a work session is much appreciated and valued. However, to reach our objective of a healthy river, and to keep me cheerful, we really do need help with our activities.

So, I must note that the scheduled weekday exercise on September 23rd was cancelled as we only had one volunteer and, to date, we only have one for this Sunday 4th October morning. While the river is low and before the winter, we can do a lot in both the leat upstream of Mill Lane and the reach down towards Pheasant Hill. Bottom of Chiltern Hill area in Chalfont St Peter is very overgrown. And it wouldn't be hard to find other worthwhile targets to help the river through the last weeks of this season and to prepare drainage as far as we can for the winter. UPDATE for October: Your neighbourhood policing team (NHPT) is based right in the heart of the village where we share offices and work in partnership with Chalfont St Peter Parish Council. The neighbourhood policing team consists of Inspector Richard Vine, Sergeant Nicky Upton, PC Gavin McVeigh, PC Matt Carson, Police Community Support Officer (PCSO) Jen Shraga and PCSO Daniel Allen.

Neighbourhood Action Group (NAG) The issues that you tell us that are of the greatest concern to you become the issues your neighborhood policing team (NHPT) focus on. These priorities are set by you at the regular drop in sessions or "Have Your Say Meetings" (HYS) held in Chalfont St Peter, the Library in Chalfont St Giles and Seer Green Baptist Church. The NAG develops local actions on these priorities. We link with our local communities, organisations and businesses to target these issues. The issues as set by you are anti-social behaviour, speeding and burglary.

Update for Anti Social Behaviour (ASB) The neighbourhood policing team is pleased to report that there was no increase in anti social behaviour throughout the summer holidays. We have had reports of groups congregating at the residential home in Glebe Close, which has been causing some distress to the residents; we had one report of a young boy poking a stick through the window of one of the residents which caused her great alarm. If you do have children going out in the evening it would be appreciated if you could ask them to stay away from this area

Update for Speeding / Parking Schools have returned and the reports of inconsiderate parking has commenced. If you use the local schools, please ensure that you park considerately and safely at all times. The Chalfont neighbourhood policing team patrol the schools regularly and will issue fixed penalty notices to vehicles that are seen to be causing an unnecessary obstruction. Please do not block the driveways of the residents near the schools. Other parking issues continue to be a problem in all areas. Parking on double yellow lines is overseen by a company called NSL. If you wish to report this type of parking problem please contact Bucks County Council. Abandoned vehicles can be reported to Chiltern District Council.

Update for Burglary We have had a number of burglaries in Chalfont St Peter in September 2015, two of which involved vehicles being stolen. Some of the burglaries are believed to have happened in the day time / early evening. As the nights are now getting darker please use timer switches on lamps when leaving your property in the evening and if you have an alarm system, please ensure that you set it every time you leave the house. If you are thinking of getting an alarm installed please look on the Chiltern District Council website that has a list of approved alarm companies in the area. If you see any suspicious activity in the area please report it immediately, such as anyone door knocking that is paying too much attention to empty houses; if you can provide a description of the person and any vehicle (with registration number if possible) this will help us in identifying these people. We host a "Have your Say" meeting every month (please see further down in this newsletter for the dates and times) so if you require crime prevention advice then please come along and visit us. Vehicle Crime Vehicle crime has been low this month, one vehicle parked on Gravel Hill was broken into and tools stolen. Please ensure you lock your vehicles when leaving them unattended and remove all valuables. The clocks will go back in October and the darker evenings will be on us, please do not leave handbags, purses, wallets or phones in your car whilst popping in to visit someone. Opportunist thieves will have your property in a matter of minutes leaving you with the inconvenience of repairing the window on your car and cancelling contracts etc.**Crime Advice** If you are a victim of crime please report it immediately to the police on 101 or in an emergency 999.
